1. Call to Order

Mayor Donald Barnard called to Order the City of Johnstown Regular Council Meeting for January 17, 2023 at 6:37 PM.

2. Roll Call

5. Johnstown-Monroe Mid-year school district update; Superintendent Wagner & Board President Swauger

Dr. Philip Wagner, Superintendent of Johnstown-Monroe School District and School Board President Tim Swauger were present for a mid-year state of the schools update. Mr. Wagner said the Board has five areas of focus: envisioning continuous improvement, communications, policy and governance, instruction, and resources. Mr. Wagner provided a look at data for growth and capacity showing that the high school will be at one hundred percent operating capacity around year 2026-2027; it was noted that modeling was pre-Intel. Their focus on communication has brought on a new Communication Specialist, Craig McDonald, they are working to enhance their social media platform and their website. Instruction has focused on enrollment, employment or enlistment, they are working to get all of their students in seventh grade focused on one of those pathways. They continue to review curriculum for K-12, this year they are focusing on math, next year will be English, language arts and literacy. Resources focus has been on safety, they had a safety assessment conducted, they work with local police, fire and the Department of Homeland Security to be prepared for many circumstances. Working on their five year and beyond forecast, they have an income tax that is due to expire in 2023 and an emergency renewal of an existing tax that expires in 2024. The Board has taken action to put both levies on the ballot in May, they are very important, the income tax levy generates 4.9 million dollars of their budget and the emergency levy is 2.2 million.

Councilman Orsini thanked Mr. Wagner for the positive focus that seems to have come together, he is encouraged by the cooperation between the School Board, the Council and

local groups to build relationships. Mayor Barnard added that he thinks it is very important for the city and zoning that they work with the schools and anticipate what they can handle for growth as we build this city and housing, we don't want to over build too quickly for the school to handle. Mr. Wagner said they know there will be growth but a steady plan for growth where they can manage not only the facilities but the financing will be important.

8. Citizen comments on matters not on the agenda

Prior to opening for comments, Mayor Barnard read an opinion from the city Law Director with regard to a citizen comment last week on what City Manager Sean Staneart could and could not do relative to property owned and zoning. Opinion read by Mayor Barnard is "That the City Manager or a City Council person would not be prohibited from discussing or participating in matters that would provide a general, uniform benefit to the citizens within the city. Public officials are only prohibited from voting, deliberating, discussing or otherwise using authority or influence with regard to a matter that would provide a definitive, particular or monetary benefit or detriment to a property in which they have an interest such as the public official's independence or judgment can be impaired. If the City Manager or a council person benefit the same as with other constituents, there is no issue, it is not enough to merely identify some indirect benefit. As it related specifically to this situation, we discussed the ownership of property within a zoning district that is being amended, the proposed zoning change in and of itself only has the possibility of creating some indirect or indefinite benefit at best. For that reason, I do not see any ethical concerns. I have attached an Ohio Ethics Commission advisory opinion as well as an info sheet that provides more on the overview." Mayor Barnard said if anyone would like those, he can get it to them.

- During DD Awareness month, the Licking County Board of DD works to share information about the various ways it supports county residents with disabilities who are a part of our community. You may see these efforts taking place through

Key facts about the Licking County Board of DD:

- The Licking County Board of Developmental Disabilities (LCBDD) has supported people in our community for more than 55 years.
- Over time, LCBDD has served many roles in the community. Today its largest responsibility is to fund services for residents with disabilities, support individuals and families to meet their outcomes and support the agency and independent Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) who provide direct care.

Who we support:

- The Licking County Board of Developmental Disabilities supported more than 2,100 people locally in 2022.
- LCBDD works with people of all ages. Our Early Childhood team works with young children, starting from birth, to help them meet early milestones. Our Transition Youth team works with young adults, 13 to 21, to help them plan their next steps after high school. Our Adult team supports individuals 22 and older, helping them connect with the resources they need to meet their outcomes, whether that means living independently, working in the community or just doing the things they truly enjoy.

- We partner with more than 170 independent providers and about 40 agencies and provide funding for their services — so families have options that best meet their needs.

- We are very grateful for the support we have received from Licking County residents. About 81 percent of the LCBDD operating budget comes from local levy dollars. These local funds allow LCBDD to pull down matching state and federal dollars to provide services. Over the last 50 years, voters have continued their financial support by voting “YES.”
- The amount of money LCBDD spends per person is the seventh lowest in the state of Ohio. Administrative costs make up less than 9 percent of our annual operating budget. We strive to be respectful and resourceful with our funding.

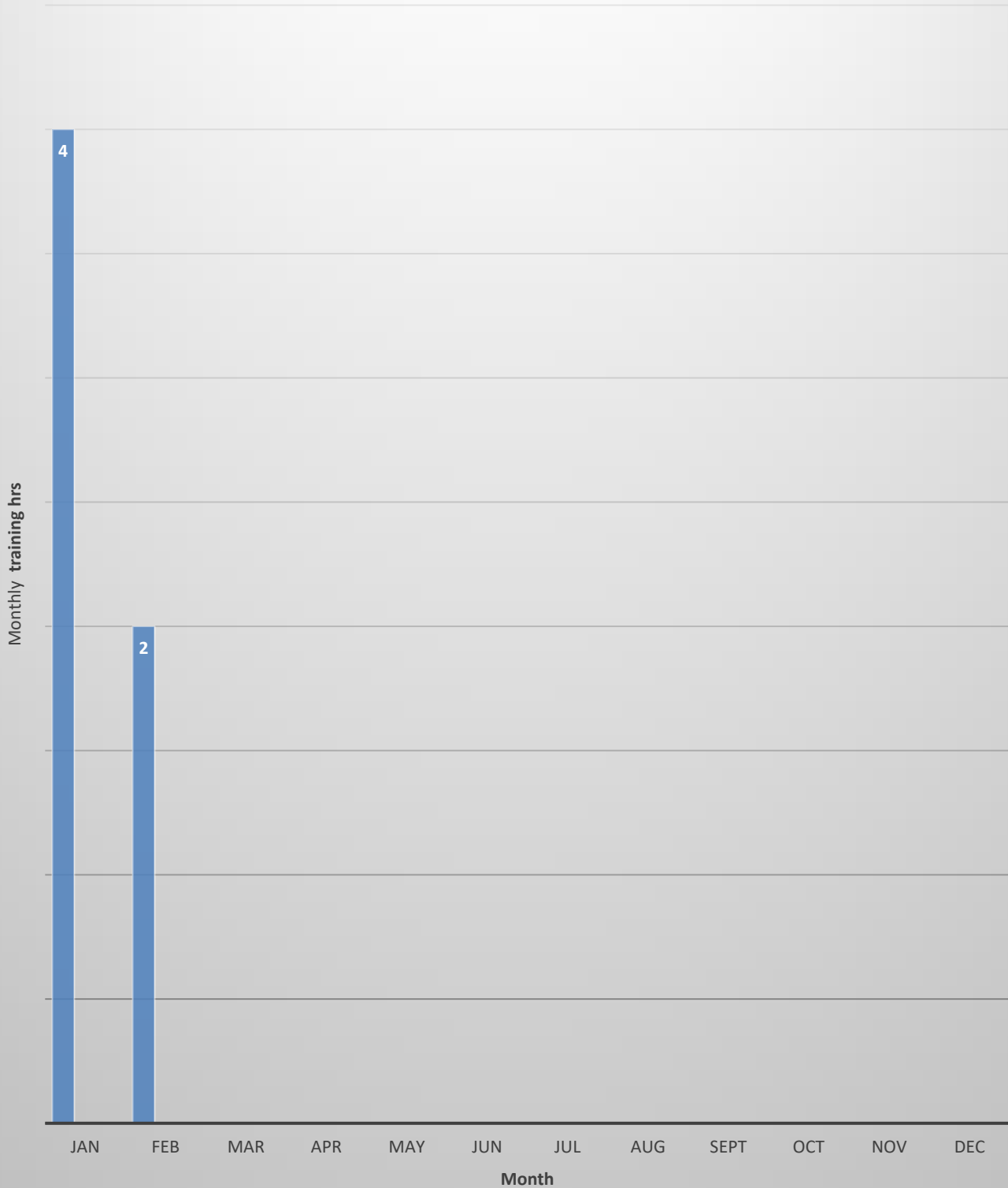

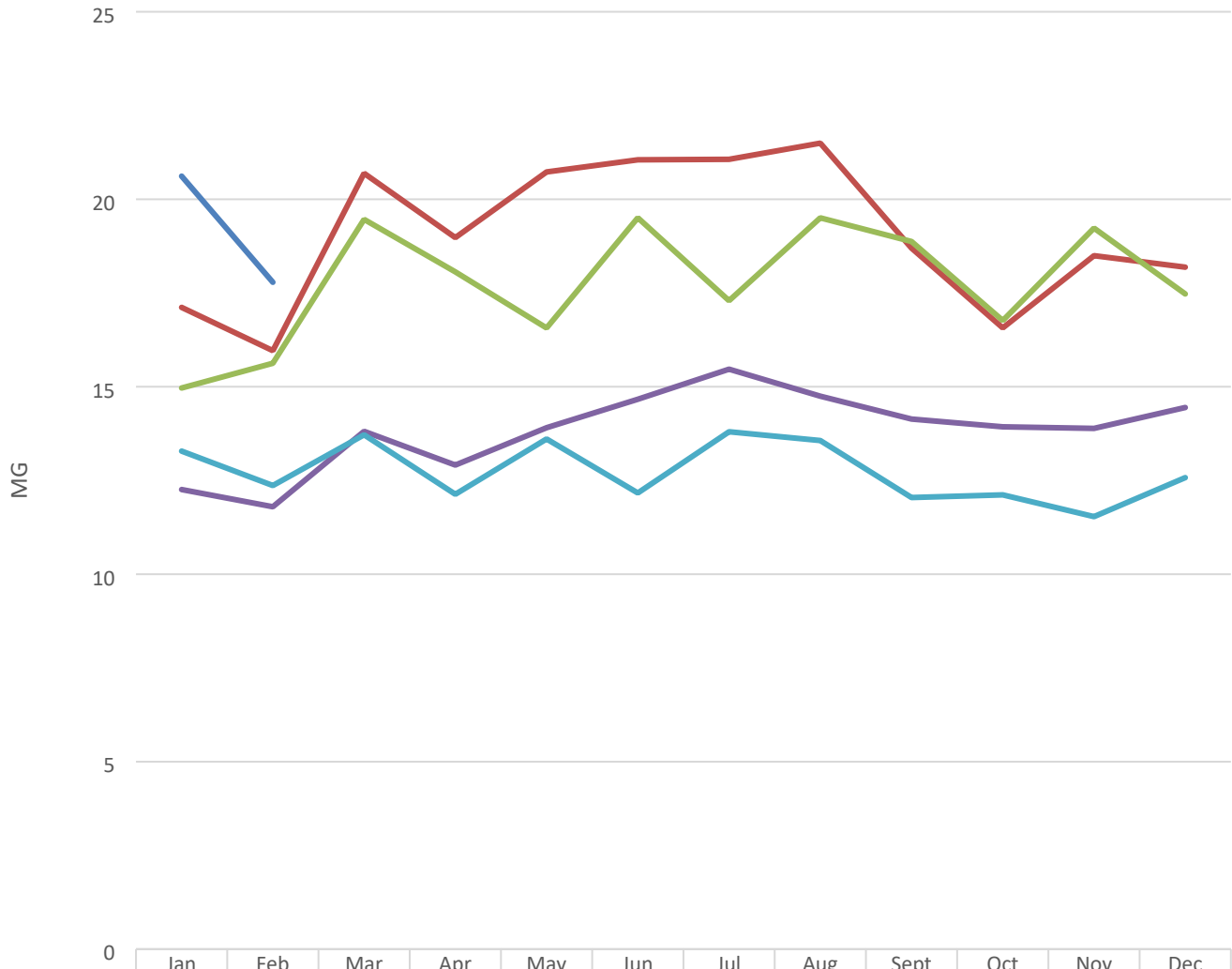

Monthly Influent MG



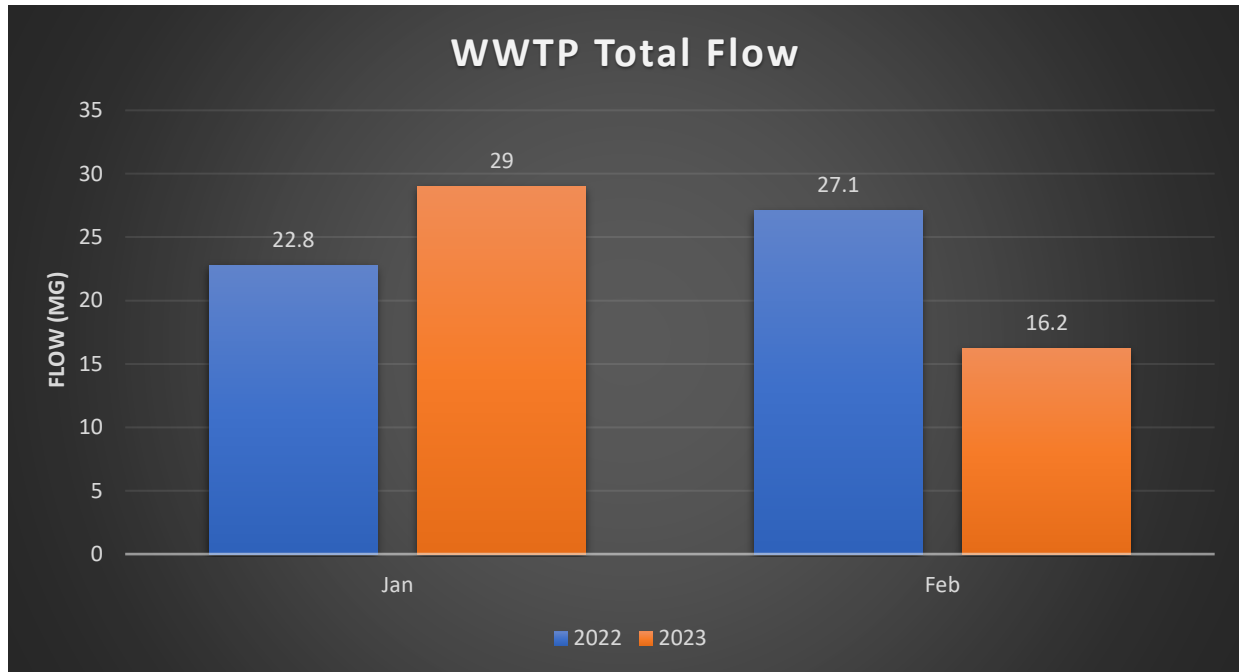

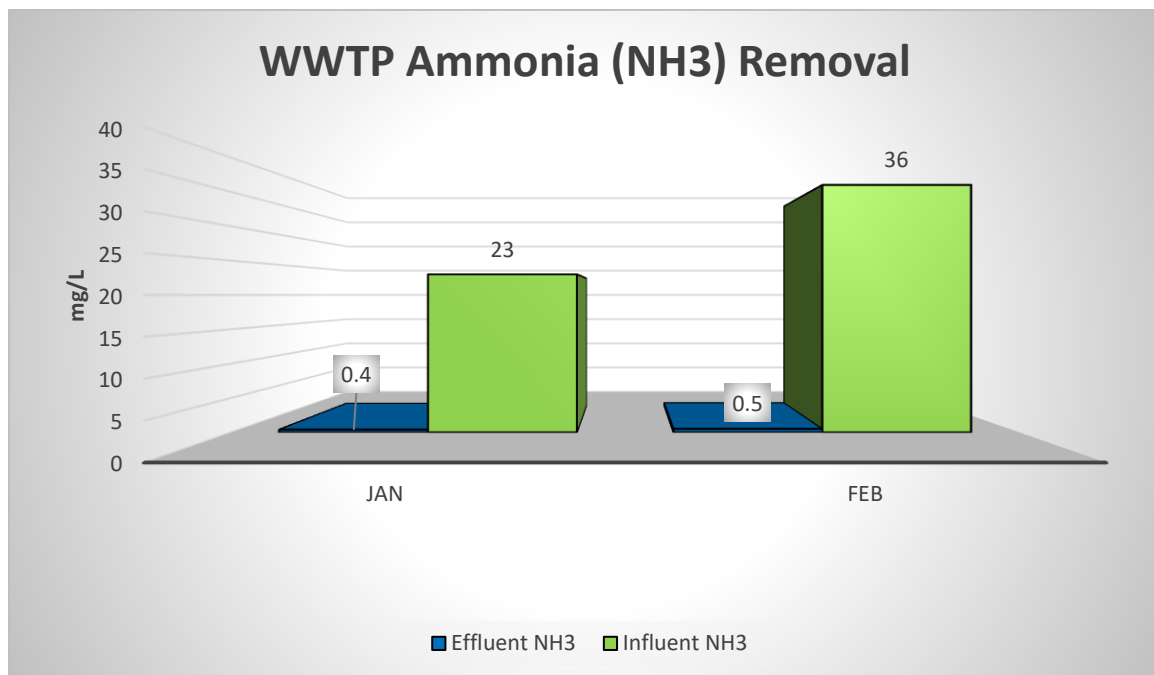

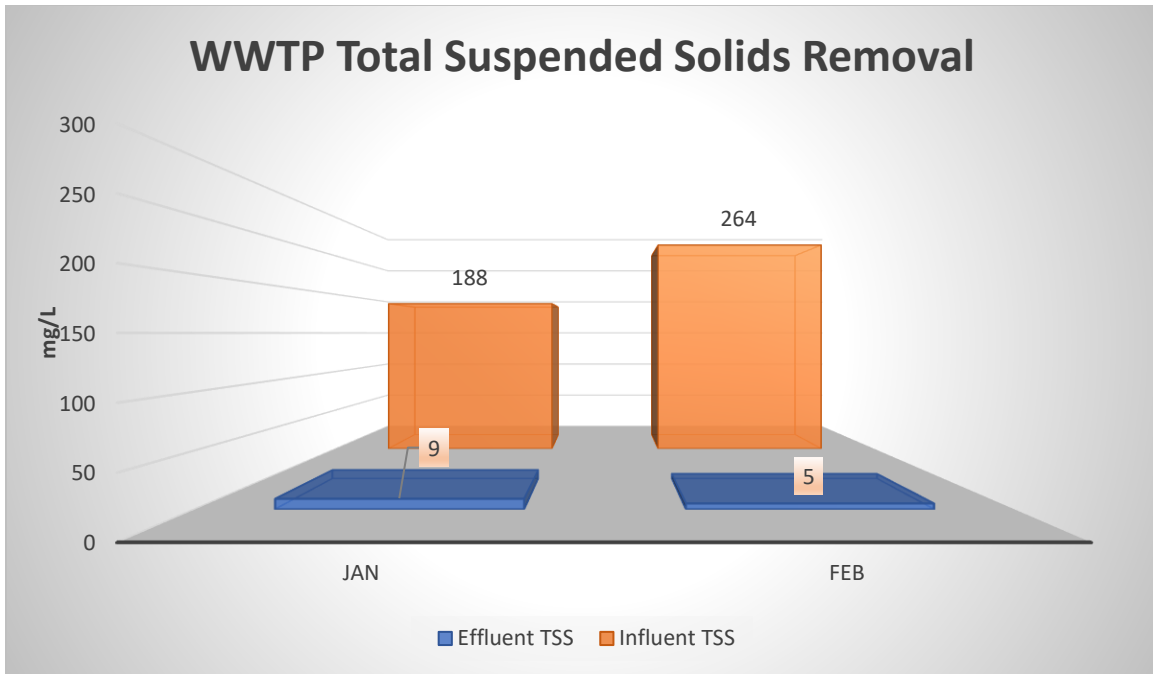
Plant Efficiency Charts

Discharge Limitations

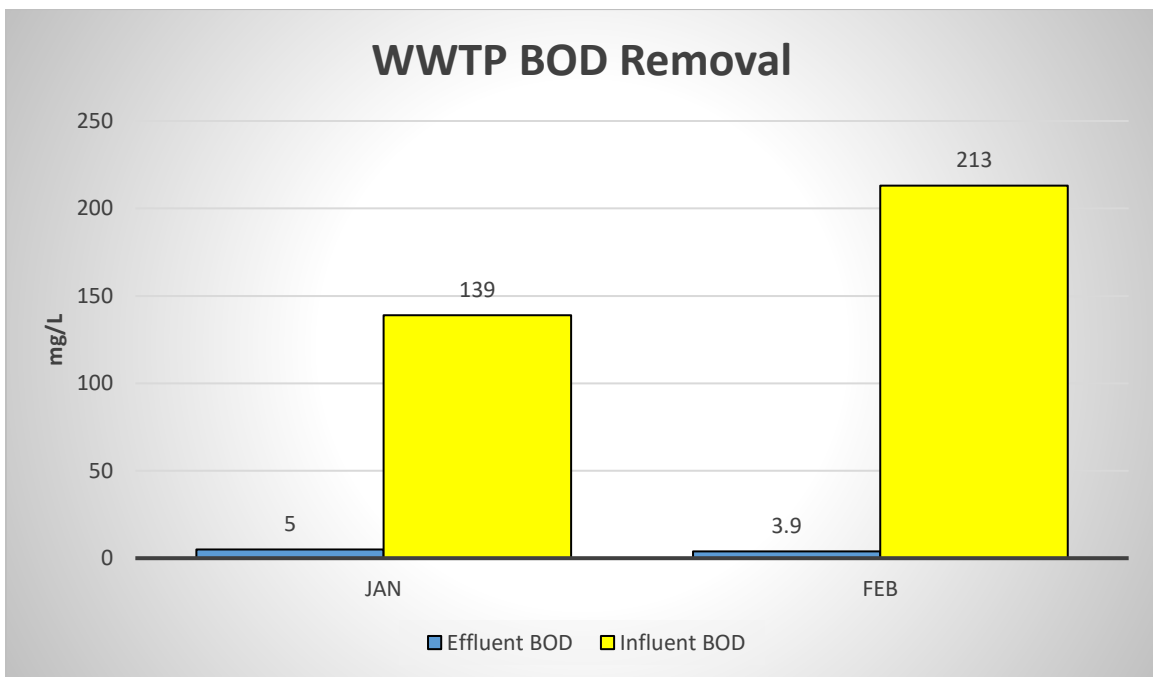

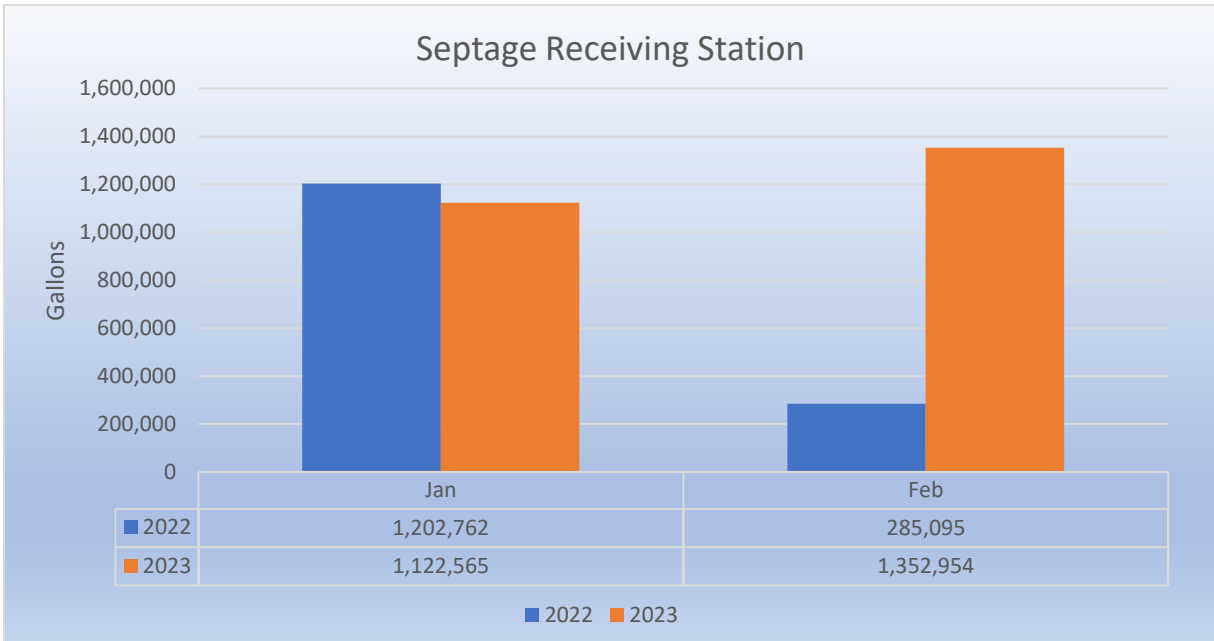

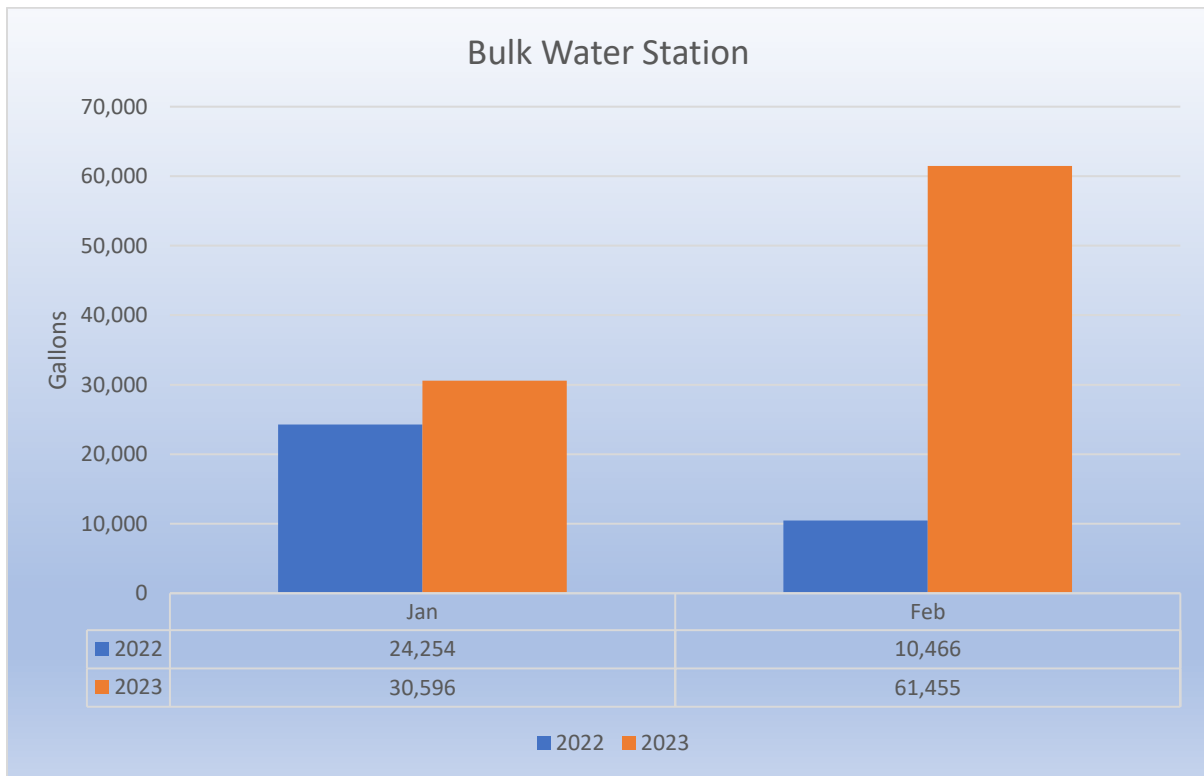


BULK SEWER & WATER

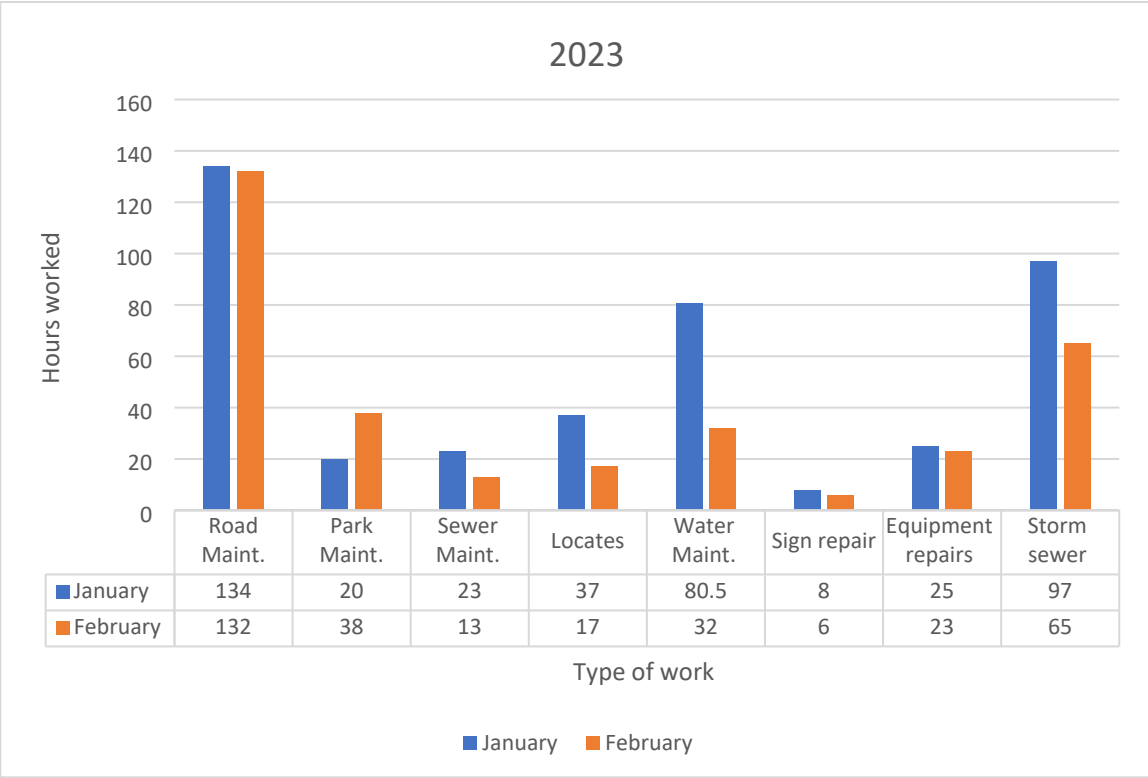

Projects

- 1) Water Tower Update – Punch list has been created but not completed. Tower is operating well
- 2) Water Plant Update – Design continues to move forward. March 20th I should have an estimated price from Bowen and Jacobs to review. J-4 drilling has begun and as of 3/3/23 National Well Service were down about 150ft full depth is approximately 380ft.
- 3) Wastewater Plant Upgrade – Stream Study draft should be available for Johnstown's review by 3/10/23. This report will aid Johnstown and engineers on future plant design.
- 4) Rolling Meadows Project is complete.
- 5) East Jersey Project – All water main has been lowered and are in service. All services on East Jersey have been hooked up to the new main. Law construction is currently installing storm sewer piping.
- 6) Pulte Housing Development – Went over punch list with Pulte representative. They will let Johnstown know when work is completed.
- 7) Public Water Systems Equipment Grant – Waiting to see if \$10,000 will be awarded to Johnstown.

WHEREAS, Schlabach Builders is planning additional phases of residential homes in the Concord Crossing East development; and

WHEREAS, in this specific instance City Council will relieve the developer of the code requirements and exempt them from the tree permit application as this development commenced under the old tree code; and

WHEREAS, the city and developer, Schlabach Builders, have come to an agreement for replacement of trees which will be removed with development of the additional phases; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF JOHNSTOWN STATE OF OHIO, AND THE MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED THERETO CONCURRING THAT:

Section One: The City of Johnstown authorizes the City Manager or designee to enter into the attached agreement with Schlabach Builders for replacement of trees.

Re: Additional Phases to Concord Crossing East

Dear Mr. Staneart and Mr. Barnard:

I am writing regarding our ongoing negotiations for the possible development of additional phases to Concord Crossing East, a residential development along Concord Road in Johnstown, Ohio. Specifically, Schlabach Builders, Ltd. plans to purchase 64.547 acres, known as Parcel No. 053-173502-00.000, Licking County, Ohio, currently owned by Johnstown Land Holdings, LLC. Said property would be developed into three additional phases of residential homes, with 153 total buildable lots, as depicted on the attached illustration.

I understand the City has agreed to grant an exemption from the tree permit application, as outlined in Johnstown City Codified Ordinance 1183.05, on the following conditions:

1. Schlabach Builders will plant street trees with 2"- 2.5" diameter along all streets within the additional phases of said subdivision, to be in 26'-35' feet intervals.
2. Schlabach Builders mitigates tree removal by planting 200 trees with 1.5"-2" diameter in addition to the street trees referenced above. Approximately 150 of said additional trees will be planted on the lots and reserve areas of the additional phases and approximately 50 may be located in existing phases of Concord Crossing East, including its reserve areas and green spaces, in coordination with the homeowner's association.
3. Schlabach Builders pays a Tree Replacement Fee of \$10,000.00 to the Memorial Tree Fund adopted by Johnstown City Council.

I understand the above to be the extent of the requirements for the tree permit process. I further understand the undersigned representatives have authority to bind the City. If accepted and approved, please sign where indicated below.
